

Checklist: Worldbuilding for Your Story

Use this checklist to systematically develop your story world and review it for logic, depth, and consistency. Check off what is already in place—and where you may want to refine further.

1. Understanding Your World

Question	Yes []	No []
Have I clearly defined what the “world” of my story is (e.g. universe, city, building, room)?		
Do I know what differs from reality in my world—and why?		
Am I aware of the rules that govern my world?		

2. Geography & Environment

Question	Yes []	No []
Do I have a clear picture of the setting of my story?		
Do I understand how locations are connected (e.g. countries, rooms, distances)?		
Have I decided which details are actually relevant to the story?		
Does the environment support the tone and plot of my story?		

3. Culture & Way of Life

Do I know which cultural elements shape my world (language, religion, values)?		
Have I defined how these elements appear in everyday life (clothing, food, behavior)?		
Do the cultural aspects fit the story and the characters?		

4. Political & Social Structure

Question	Yes []	No []
Do I know what kind of system my characters live in (e.g. democracy, monarchy)?		
Are there conflicts or tensions that influence the story?		
Is it clear how these structures affect my characters?		

5. Characters Within the World

Do I know where my characters stand in society?		
Is it clear how the world influences their decisions?		
Do their behavior, language, and appearance fit their background and environment?		

6. Logic & Rules

Does my world follow clear, understandable rules?		
Have I explained deviations (e.g. magic, technology) in a way readers can follow?		
Am I consistent within my own rules?		
Are there no obvious logical inconsistencies?		

7. Implementation in the Text

Do I include only relevant details in my story?		
Do I avoid overly long or unnecessary descriptions?		
Do I introduce information only when it becomes relevant?		

8. Workflow & Organization

Do I have a dedicated place for my worldbuilding (notes, document, tool)?		
Do I write down new ideas immediately?		
Do I check new elements for consistency with my world?		

9. Weiterdenken deiner Welt

Do I see potential to reuse my world for future stories?		
Are there places, characters, or conflicts that could be developed further?		

Evaluation

- **Many Yes answers** → Your world is well-structured and clearly developed.
- **Some gaps** → Your world works, but could be refined further.
- **Many No answers** → Take time to strengthen your worldbuilding before continuing.

Final Thought

Worldbuilding doesn't have to be perfect—but it needs to be consistent. If your world follows clear rules, your characters act credibly within it, and your readers intuitively understand it, you create what every strong story needs: immersion.
